

## Chairman's Message

Harrow Council announced that it has to make £25M in cuts this year and a further £50M over the next 3 years as a result of Central Government cuts to its funding. It is undertaking a consultation exercise as to what to cut. One of the possible cuts is "Close the Harrow Arts Centre and look for an alternative space for it to continue from 2016 onwards." You may remember that I warned of this possibility at the last AGM and in the subsequent newsletter.

council\_budgets\_and\_spending/1375/budget\_proposals Members of the committee met with Andrew Welch, a consultant employed by Harrow Arts Centre (HAC) to put together a feasibility plan. He said that the Council are thinking of selling most of the land with the outside buildings—Daisy's, the Travellers' Theatre, the Grimsdyke, Greenhill, Rayners and Weald rooms, the Hatch End suite, and the Boiler Building basically the buildings east of the car park. And rew Welch is to put together a plan for retaining the rest of the site and perhaps building on the side of the Elliott Hall on what is now the car park via planning gain through a deal with the developer. He further told us that the Council is looking for the Arts Centre and the Museum to be hived off into a charitable trust with no Council fundina.

It subsequently emerged that the council cannot build on the playing fields or other open land.

The implications for us are serious. We have over 40 classes per month at HAC, and even if a reduced size HAC was retained, it would be difficult to accommodate them all. Removal of Council funding for the Arts Centre suggests an increase in fees for room hire, a substantial part of our budget.

Your Committee set up a Campaign Committee to organise a campaign against the proposed cuts. A petition was organised by Anne Gerrard and obtained over 5000 signatures. The Hatch End Association also organised a petition with over 6000 signatures. These were debated by the council on 13<sup>th</sup> November.

Councillor Sue Anderson, Labour's cabinet member for Culture & Resident Engagement, told the council: Cont'd on p.2

"I am so very pleased to find out how much support the Harrow Arts Centre has.

"We are in a difficult financial position, but we have seen your petitions and we can now tell you that the centre will not close at the end of this financial year.

"Officers will begin exploring a business case to find a viable, sustainable future for the building. I cannot say that it will be the same as it is now, it may be different. But from how much support we can see it has, we must work hard to do our best to find a solution."

Councillor Perry, the Labour leader made a pledge to work with the petition organisers to work for a viable solution.

So it appears that the Arts Centre is saved for the next year, though it may be that the outbuildings are still under threat. It is still likely that there will be a large increase in room hiring fees.

I wish to thank all those members who helped with collecting signatures for the petition.

We need to keep campaigning to save the Arts Centre as we know it.

I am currently involved in one at the British Museum researching items from their handling collection. Two simple items have taken me on an amazing journey from tribal customs in the Congo to spice markets in Yemen.

The Charterhouse Trust in Smithfield are now developing an archive research project there to start after next Easter –The project aims to build a database of the 'Brothers' of the Charterhouse Almshouses, by researching historic papers held in the London Metropolitan Archives dating from between 1620 and 1924. This should provide a fascinating insight into London history. We hope this will be the first of many collaborations with the Charterhouse as it develops its new Heritage Lottery funded museum (due to open in 2016).

### FIRST STEPS IN EMAIL, INTERNET, AND BEYOND

This unique course mixes the computer-literate pupils of Bentley Wood High School with mature members of our U3A who wish to learn the basics of this computer age, including how to set up and use email, how to access the amazing amount of information in Google (The New Encyclopaedia Britannica) and to communicate with loved ones in foreign parts by Skype (free video calls!). ### TUESDAY 27TH JANUARY 2015—BRENTFORD MUSICAL MUSEUM, KEW BRIDGE

Enjoy a tour and step back 100 years or more and enter the magical world of automatic music. In the era before microphones, an amazing range of instruments was invented to bring the works of the great composers into homes, great and small, and the cafes of the day. The visit will include delicate musical boxes, reproducing pianos, organs and self playing violins. You will be fascinated by the intricate workings and amazing sound of an Orchestrion that recreates the sound of a concert orchestra. ### GREAT GARDENS & GRAND HOUSES – MAY 19 - 21, 2015 A tour of the ancient Saxon kingdom of WESSEX

This is King Alfred country - the one who burned the cakes, better known today as part of the West Country. The tour includes Wiltshire and Hampshire, two counties with many splendid houses and beautiful gardens, both on the large National Trust scale and smaller private gardens.

Our tour is 3 Days/2 Nights on half-board in the **Botley Park Hotel**, in the pretty village of Botley, NW of Southampton. It is a Golf and Spa hotel and offers guests the use of a sauna and a swimming pool. Included in our visits will be the home of the Earls of Pembroke, **Wilton House**. It is set in a landscaped parkland created by Isaac de Caus in the 1600s and further improved over the centuries using famous garden architects appointed by the owners. Today there is a water garden with an impressive fountain, a walled garden and a superb Palladian bridge over the river Nadder which runs through the estate. ### THE PEAK DISTRICT 6-DAY TOUR 2<sup>ND</sup>−7<sup>TH</sup> SEPTEMBER 2015

This 6 day tour of the Peak District consists of visits to **Kedleston Hall** (NT), the **Crown Derby** factory, **Sudbury Hall** and the **Museum of Childhood** (NT) and beautiful **Chatsworth House**. Also included is a journey on the **Peak Railway** and a cable car ride up the **Heights of Abraham** as well as visits to Matlock, Chesterfield, Buxton and Bakewell. On the way home we visit Wollaton Hall in Nottingham.

Kedleston Hall takes you back in time to the 1760's and is a spectacular neo-classical mansion displaying an extensive collection of paintings, sculptures and original furnishings. At Crown Derby we have a factory tour where we see craftsmen and artists at work. Sudbury Hall is a 17th century family home and prize winning museum. Journey through childhood with a collection of games you used to play and have a go at being a chimney sweep in the Museum of Childhood. Chatsworth has over 30 rooms to explore and has one of Europe's most significant art collections along with stories of 16 generations of the Cavendish family. The ride on the Peak Railway will take us through the Peak District, and the Heights of Abraham cable car goes up to 60 acres of landscaped gardens and various attractions including a Fossil Factory, the Great Masson Cavern, the Masson Pavilion, walks and much more. We also have a full day with a guide who takes us around Chesterfield, Buxton and the Peak District and we finish our trip with a visit to Wollaton Hall in Nottingham.

# **Recent Activities**

### A VISIT TO HARROW SCHOOL 14th July 2014

In July this year a group from Harrow U3A went on a tour of Harrow School and we were taken round by Anne Hall-Williams. It was a very informative tour.

We first went into the 4th-Form Room which is the original school room of the John Lyon Foundation—the school's name under the original charter. The room still has the canopied seat and all the oak paneling that makes it famous. (photo-back page) One can still see the rough graffiti engravings made by the boys including Byron, Richard Brinsley Sheridan, Robert Peel and of course Winston Churchill. We saw the cane and the birch which were both brought out of the cupboard.

We also saw the stool that boys would have to bend over when being caned. I hasten to add the cane was not needed for any members on this tour !

Famous at Harrow School is the straw hat (not a boater!) and there are strict rules relating to the wearing of them. We were told that all boys are required to wear their hats when going to or from lessons and to "cap" all teachers (also known as "beaks") who pass them on any public road and chapel terrace, which is done by the boy raising his forefinger to the brim of his hat. Those who do not follow these rules are punished.

We then went to the museum. In here they have recreated a

modern boy's room and also (in comparison) one from around 1890 when Churchill was at the school.

Finally we went into the Speech Room. This room is large enough to hold all 840 boys and the teaching staff. The building was completed in 1877 and is semicircular in shape. There are a number of portraits in the room, notably Sir Winston Churchill and King Hussein of Jordan. The Jordanian King would return to the school on many occasions but did not want any fuss made of his visits. Sir Winston Churchill returned at least annually and so indeed does his family to this day. Ian Green

### TO BOND WITH BASILDON

A sleepy gaggle of U3A'ers assembled at 8.15am and 8.30am and off we all went towards Reading.

The early start was due to the special conducted tour at Basildon Park of the TV Locations used in the series Downton Abbey My wife and I were not interested in the Downton Abbey Locations tour, but joined a "History tour" which detailed the past of Basildon Park and how it was restored, mainly due to the efforts of Lady Illiffe.

This remarkable lady was of French extraction and was a very "hands on" designer who rarely missed the opportunity for a bargain. When her neighbour mentioned that she was replacing her drapes, Lady Illiffe immediately asked if she could have the old curtains. This request was granted and she hung the damask as wall covering in the traditional Victorian manner and these now adorn a bedroom wall. Lady Illiffe actually took part in hanging the drapes and was also responsible for making most of the sets of curtains in the house and also at least one of the carpets.

An interesting artefact was a pair of "medicine dolls" in the style of Japanese figures, one male and one female, now converted into table lamps. These

were used by the modest Victorians who were too shy or reserved to disrobe before their doctor and pointed



out, on the appropriate doll, where their pain was. Lady Illiffe herself actually made the clothing that now adorns these figurines.

Many of the doors and fireplaces were removed from

#### 5th August 2014

Basildon House when it was becoming dilapidated, some going to Lord Illiffe's London home, some being damaged during the blitz. Many of the missing items have now been returned to their rightful places in the house.

We were taken through the 1950's kitchen which was very nostalgic, and we were treated to mini-scones being made on the premises and were delicious.

The grounds were well tended and there were large areas of trees and some more cultivated areas near the house.

Some of us took advantage of a buggy, available on request, to take us from the car park to the house and back, for those not wishing to take the walk of approx. 12 minutes.

Our thanks to Toni and Jack for organizing a great trip and to our driver for taking care of us all so well.

#### DICKENS TO DIAMONDS 1st October 2014

Having been born and bred in London, it never fails to amaze how little I know of this great city. I joined another of Rachel Kolsky's lively walks, this one around the Hatton Garden district.

Britton Street was famous for brewing gin. We all know Hogarth's 'Gin Lane' drawings, but it is difficult to criticise people for opting to drink gin rather than contaminated water. In fact, gin distilleries are now enjoying a renaissance. Wouldn't that be an interesting walk? I'll bring the tonic!!

The fragrantly named Saffron Hill, featured in 'Oliver Twist', is reputed to be the inspiration for Fagin's den. Being none too savoury, it was said to be perfumed by saffron grown in land owned by the Bishop of Ely who also owned property in London.

In 1561 Elizabeth I attended a masque at Inner Temple and was quite taken by a young man called Christopher Hatton. Apparently he had very shapely legs and it is rumoured he and the Queen danced around a cherry tree in the area of the Old Mitre Pub, which dates from 1546 *(photo-back page)*. He became an important figure in her Court, was knighted, and in 1578 she granted him the Bishop of Ely's house in Holborn, despite protests from the Bishop!

The 19<sup>th</sup> Century saw the arrival of many Jews who brought with them their skills in the diamond trade. The offices of De Beers are in Charterhouse Street, set up in 1888 by Cecil Rhodes and Barney Barnato in South Africa. They were instrumental in promoting the idea of engagement rings and, when that was successful, encouraged the sale of eternity rings. Clever marketing!

The area around Clerkenwell also attracted many Italians who, luckily for us, brought their ice cream with them along with many other mouthwatering dishes.

It was a really interesting and fun walk and I would encourage you to join Rachel and share in her enthusiasm for discovering the hidden gems of the best city in the world. Lynne Dorff

How do you get information when you start to lose your sight?

There is a free service of audio Local News, Information and Interest, available from the 'Harrow Talking Newspapers' and 'Hearabouts Talking Magazine' for anyone in the borough who cannot read 12-point print. 
